Our 2024 Impact

Empowered Sustainable Agriculture Through Local Leadership

Agriculture reduces dependence on outside income and fosters a thriving local economy, promoting mutual aid and regional collaboration. In Lory, Haiti, our Farmstand Project embodies this approach by prioritizing sustainable practices and local empowerment.

Our Impact:

To strengthen these efforts, we hired a female Haitian agronomist to provide expert guidance, training, and mentorship to growers and farmstand families. Her leadership will not only enhance the farm's success but it will also establish a consistent teaching model for our village and surrounding communities.

Built Durable Fencing Around the Farmstand

We installed durable fencing and a security gate around the Farmstand in Lory, Haiti, providing a safe and protected space for agricultural work and community education.

Our Impact:

This critical improvement enhances the farm's ability to support local growers and families while serving as a hub for sustainable farming practices and regional collaboration.

Provided Hygiene Education and Clean Water Filtration Systems for 100 families.

"Contaminated water and poor sanitation are linked to transmission of diseases such as cholera, diarrhoea, dysentery, hepatitis A, typhoid and polio. Absent, inadequate, or inappropriately managed water and sanitation services expose individuals to preventable health risks." Source: WHO

Our Impact:

In January of 2024 we were able to provide clean water education and filters to these families.

Our 2023 Impact

Farmstand Families Received Educational Sponsorship for their Children

"The most recent analysis on education's impact on poverty by the GEM Report is based on the average effects of education on growth and poverty reduction in developing countries from 1965 to 2010. It shows that nearly 60 million people could escape poverty if all adults had just two more years of schooling. If all adults completed secondary education, 420 million could be lifted out of poverty, reducing the total number of people in poverty by more than half globally."

Our Impact:

Donors helped us sponsor the education of 12 children in 2023.

Clean Water Partnership with Wine to Water

In the fall of 2023 Wine to Water made us an official Clean Water Partner.

Our Impact:

This Partnership provided us access to the resources we needed to bring clean water to the families of Lory, Haiti.

Monthly Sustainable Agriculture Training & Workshops

A sustainable local food system ensures everyone has access to sufficient and nutritious food. It also creates economic development and lifts communities out of poverty.

Our Impact:

In 2023 we focused heavily on sustainable agriculture training and support for our local growers and farmstand families

Land was acquired for the Farmstand project

Poverty and poor soil management are partially due to the system of land tenure. When land is farmed by small holders who own their land and have the ability to reinvest profits to make needed long term improvements, productivity is much higher than when it is held by landlords who rent the land out or have it farmed by sharecroppers so that wealth is extracted from the farmers and concentrated.

Land has tremendous capacity to be regenerated when it is owned and tended by small holders even if it has been seriously degraded.

Our Impact:

Through the support of our donors we were able to raise enough funds in 2023 to acquire a permanent piece of land for the Farmstand Project.

Our 2025 Goals

Build a Rainwater Irrigation System

Approximately 80% of global agricultural land relies on rain-fed irrigation. Without access to clean or consistent water sources, crop yields in many developing countries are over 50% lower than their potential.

Our Goal:

Access to clean water is a critical challenge in Haiti, impacting agriculture and food security. Our goal is to install a rainwater irrigation system at the Village Farm to collect and store rainwater for crop irrigation. This system will provide a sustainable water source, helping farmers overcome water scarcity, improve yields, and support community resilience.

Provide a Safer, More Reliable Vehicle for Our Haitian Team

Reliable transportation is always important in Haiti. Our little car has been good to us but is currently being held together with prayers.

Our Goal:

In 2025, our goal is to purchase a safer and more reliable vehicle for our Haitian team to ensure they can travel securely and efficiently across the region. This vehicle will support our team's ability to manage projects, deliver resources, and engage with local communities, ultimately enhancing our impact and fostering greater connection with the people we serve.

Enhanced Safety for our Community and Farm

Political instability, economic hardship, and social unrest have made certain areas of the country more vulnerable to theft, vandalism, and other safety risks. By hiring a security guard, we can ensure the protection of our assets, staff, and local community members. This added layer of security fosters a safer environment for team members to carry out their work without concern, enables uninterrupted project implementation, and helps build trust within the communities we serve. It ultimately ensures that our mission and impact can continue to grow without unnecessary disruption.


Our Goal:

A Letter From the Founder

In my first year serving in Haiti, I often cried myself to sleep, overwhelmed by the day's harrowing experiences. I held newborns as they took their last breath in my arms. I hid in car trunks and on floorboards as we navigated through streets engulfed in flames and protests. I hiked for miles into remote villages, only to realize that the few bags of rice in my pack could never be enough to feed the starving children gazing back at me.

The long days left me feeling both angry and helpless, and many times, I cried out to God in anguish, "Why have you brought me here?!"

But still I continued on. Every few months, I packed my bags, kissed my family goodbye, and boarded another plane back to Haiti.

Years later, when I reflect on those early days, I see the seeds of what has brought us to where we are now. Every sad smile, every grain of rice that nourished a hungry child, every water filter placed in the hands of a desperate family, and every child I held as they took their last breath—each moment played a crucial role in God's plan for me and our ministry.

The work we do in Haiti is the hardest thing I've ever done, and I know I could never do it on my own strength alone.

So I leave you with this:

When God calls you to do something hard, He imprints it so deeply in your heart that you can't ignore it.

How is He calling you, and will you answer?
